Evergreens	
Scotch Pine (Pinus Sylvestria) “Belgium” One of the best Christmas tree strains. Holds color in winter. Grows to 60ft	Red Pine (Pinus Resinosa) Also called Norway Pine. Fast growing lumber species. Handles adverse environment well. Grows to 75ft
White Pine (Pinus Strobus) Native 5 needle Pine with a variety of uses. Christmas Trees, windbreaks, wildlife habitat or as an ornamental. Fast growth to 150ft	Jack Pine (Pinus) Fast growing important pulp wood species that will colonize a site quickly. Excellent for sandy dry areas Fast growth 60 feet
Blue Spruce (Picea Pungens) Slow growing Spruce Bluish color varies to dark green, Very hardy. Grows to 50ft	White Spruce (Picea Glauca) Hardy northern spruce with stiff bluish green needles. Symmetric growth. Short needle length to 50 feet
Frasier Fir (Abies Fraseri) Very popular for Christmas trees. Good needle retention and soft, shiny bright green needles. Medium growth to 60ft.	White Cedar (Thuja Occidentalis) “Arborvitae” Native to the eastern U.S. and Canada. Excellent for screens, drained sites. Bronze winter color. Fast Growth to 25-35 feet
DECIDUOUS	
Silver Maple (Acer Saccarinum) Best pick for quick shade. Light green leaves turn bright yellow in fall. Very fast growth to 150ft.	Red Maple (Acer Rubrum) Grows well in moist bottomland. Fire red fall foliage. Excellent choice as ornamental. Medium growth to 120ft.
Sugar Maple (Acer Saccharum) (Hard maple) Hardy maple valued for many woodland projects. Makes a great shade tree and is valued for its syrup. Brilliant fall color. Fast growth to 70 feet.	White Birch (Betula Payifera) Most ornamental of all native birches. Chalk white bark peels in papery layers. Golden fall color. Fast growth to 80 feet
River Birch (Betula Nigra) Excellent ornamental tree, Very heat and cold tolerant. Resistant to insects that plague the white birch. Dark cinnamon to light creamy white bark. Fast growth to 90 feet	Pin Oak (Quercus ellipsoidalis) Strong straight central trunk, excellent form and fall color, small acorns that benefit wildlife. Tolerant of alkaline and compacted poor soil. Medium to fast growth to 75feet
Red Oak (Quercus Rubra) Hardy northern oak prized for its lumber and beneficial acorns. Dark waxy green leaves. Medium to fast growth to 80-100 feet	White Oak (Quercus Alba) Large majestic form, valuable hardwood, good fall color. Acorns benefit wildlife. Slow to medium growth to 80-100 feet
Burr Oak (Quercus macrocarpa) Impressive large tree for shade or wildlife feed, deer love their sweet nuts, Oak wilt resistant, more tolerant of harsh urban conditions than other oaks. Fast growth to 80-100 feet	Red Osier Dogwood (Cornus Sericea) Dense growing shrub with striking red bark in winter. Clusters of beautiful white blossoms followed by purple fall berries are a major food source for migrating birds. Dark green waxy leaves. Fast growth to 9 feet
FRUITS & NUT	
Black Walnut (Juglans Nigra) Fast growing popular hardwood tree, nuts are thick shelled and full flavored. Tolerates cold climates. Good for wildlife. Makes a good shade tree. Fast growth to 80ft.	Black Cherry (Prunus Serotina) Excellent ornamental, deep green leaves Good for wildlife, highly prized wood, fruit used for preserves. Medium growth 80 feet
Nanking Cherry (Prunus Tomentosa) Very hardy, flowering ornamental & windbreak filler. Dark waxy green leaves. Fruit used for jam & jelly. Grows to 9ft.	Nannyberry (Viburnum lentago) Open shrub to small tree. Creamy white bloom clusters in spring yield a plethora of food for wildlife in the fall. Tolerates drought and shade. Medium growth to 20ft
High Bush Cranberry (Viburnum Trilobum) White flowers in flat clusters in May. Beautiful lustrous green leaves followed by scarlet red fruit and leaves in fall. Fast growth to 8-12 feet.	Common Apple (Malus Domestica) Seed propagated domestic apple. Useful for wildlife habitat, home orchard, or shelterbelt filler. Grows to 25ft
Reneka Crab (Malus X Reneka) Great in extreme cold. Vigorous grower with profuse fragrant white flowers. Excellent form with straight trunk. One of our best picks for wildlife species crab. Purple elongated fruit. Fast growth to 15 feet	Serviceberry (amelanchier Canadensis) Masses of white early spring flowers emerge before any trees leaf out, edible purple fruit in mid-summer, then bright yellow to red foliage in fall. A small shrubby specimen tree, does well in shade. Medium growth to 25ft
Butternut (juglans cinerea) Resembles Black Walnut but smaller. Delicious hard shelled nuts have rich, oily, spicy flavor. Wood used For rifle stocks. Fast growth to 60ft	American Hazelnut (corylus Americana) A vigorous multi stemmed Shrub, tolerant of varied soil types, dark green summer foliage turning bright yellow in fall. Interesting floret type seed packets hold sweet filberts highly prized by most wildlife including people. Grows to 10ft
LARGE TREE AND SHRUBS	
Quaking Aspen (populous tremuloides) A beautiful fast growing native tree that is extremely cold hardy. Many mistake their bright white bark as birch. Grows well in moist areas. Dark green leaves tremble in the slightest breeze exposing the white underside. Bright gold fall color. Fast growth to 50 ft.	Hybrid Poplar (imperial Carolina) A long lived hybrid poplar with pyramidal habit. Huge waxy green leaves clatter in the slightest of summer breezes Disease resistance and very vigorous growth, up to 5-8’ per year.. Fast growth....60-120 feet
River Birch Clump (Betula Nigra) Excellent ornamental tree, very heat and cold tolerant. Resistant to insects that plague the white birch. Quickly replacing white birch as a valuable landscape tree. Dark cinnamon to light creamy white peeling bark. Fast growth to 90 feet	White Birch Clump (Betula Payifera) Most ornamental of all native birches. Chalk white bark peels in papery layers. Golden fall color. Fast growth to 80 feet
Pee Gee Hydrangea (Hydranga paniculata) “Grandiflora” fast growth to 10ft. Potted graceful arching branches with clusters of pale pink flowers in June, red fall color. Likes sun but will stand shade.	Blue Spruce (Picea Pungens) (unsheared) Balled root. Slow growing spruce with sharp needles, very hardy, bluish color varies to dark green. Slow growth to 50ft

	<p style="text-align: center;">Cedar Wood Duck Houses</p> <p>Wood Duck houses should be mounted on a post or <u>deciduous tree</u> 6 to 8 feet high with the entrance hole facing south or west and within 30 to 100 feet from the nearest water. It is best not to put up wood duck houses within sight of each other.</p>	<p>\$45 Each</p>		
<p>Same style as the Cedar Houses</p>	<p>Pine Wood Duck Houses</p>	<p>\$25 Each</p>		
	<p style="text-align: center;">Pine Bat Houses</p> <p>The box should be placed at least ten feet above the ground in an open area orientated south-southeast (135° azimuth is optimal) where it receives at least seven hours of direct sun.</p>	<p>\$12 Each</p>		
	<p style="text-align: center;">Pine Blue Bird Houses</p> <p>Face the bluebird house away from the prevailing wind. 4-6 ft. high on a post is optimal for the house. Bluebirds don't like thick vegetation near the house.</p>	<p>\$6 Each 2 for \$10</p>		
	<p style="text-align: center;">Wren Bird House</p> <p>Mount or hang the house six to ten feet high in or near a tree or shrub. House wrens seem to prefer areas with trees and shrubs. Fencerows and brushy draws are ideal.</p>	<p>\$5 Each 2 for \$8</p>
